INTRODUCTION

This material has been prepared to provide families an opportunity to gather and spend time reflecting and discussing about the scripture readings of the 8th Sunday of Ordinary Time. This coming week, we will also be celebrating Ash Wednesday, which marks the beginning of the season of Lent.

HOW TO USE THE MATERIAL

This document contains activities that members of the family may complete individually (just the children), in pairs (with parental assistance), or as an entire family. It would be helpful to print a hard-copy, so that members of your family may carry out different activities at the same time.

WHEN TO USE THE MATERIAL

During the week after the family has celebrated the Mass of 8th Sunday of Ordinary Time

OPENING PRAYER

Heavenly Father, we thank you for the gift of each one gathered here in your presence today. Thank you, Lord Jesus, for bringing us the gift of life and faith. Holy Spirit, the Spirit of Peace, guide us during this family gathering. We make this prayer in Jesus' name, Amen.



SCRIPTURE REFLECTION

Invite someone to read **Luke 6: 39-45**. Then, as a family reflect on the questions given below and share your responses with one another. If necessary, parents are encouraged to rephrase the information and questions according to their children's level of understanding.

Time of reflection and response:

Jesus said, "Can a blind person lead another blind person? Surely both will fall. So why do you pay attention to the speck in your brother's eye while you are not conscious of the log in your own eye? First remove the log from your eye, then you will see clearly enough to remove the speck from your brother's eye."

What are the beliefs and prejudices I have that might be affecting the way I see other people and the world?

What are the practices or behaviours I have that might be a 'log in my eye'?

Jesus continued, "Each tree is known by the fruit it bears. Similarly, the good person draws good things from the good stored in his heart and an evil person draws evil things from the evil stored in his heart. For the mouth speaks from the fullness of the heart."

What is in my heart? Do my words and actions bear the fruit of a good heart?

What can I do this coming season of Lent to bear good fruit from my heart?

Today, Jesus teaches that we need to be aware of what is in our eyes and our hearts. Our words and actions are a fruit of the good or evil in our hearts and our eyes affect what we see as good or evil. We pray for the Holy Spirit to always guide us so that we may always bear good fruit from a good heart.

Say together as a family:

"Lord Jesus, you came down from heaven that we might have life in your name. You ask us to believe and to put our hope in you. We know that you love us and watch over us always. May we continue to grow in our faith and follow you, especially in times of trouble."
