
CATECHESIS@HOME 2022 #28 "WILL NOT GOD SEE JUSTICE DONE TO HIS CHOSEN?" (29th Sunday of Ordinary Time)

INTRODUCTION

Dear parents and guardians. This material has been prepared to provide families an opportunity to gather and spend time reflecting and discussing about the gospel reading of 29th Sunday of Ordinary Time.

HOW TO USE THE MATERIAL

This document contains activities that members of the family may complete individually (just the children), in pairs (with parental assistance), or as an entire family. It would be helpful to print a hard-copy, so that members of your family may carry out different activities at the same time.

WHEN TO USE THE MATERIAL

During the week after the family has celebrated the Mass of 29th Sunday of Ordinary Time.

OPENING PRAYER

Heavenly Father, we have gathered here in the name of Jesus. Help me to remember that You are kind and just in all Your ways. Holy Spirit, guide us during this lesson. We make this prayer in Jesus' name, Amen.



SCRIPTURE REFLECTION

Invite someone to read Luke 18: 1-8. Later, reflect on the questions given together as a family, and share your responses with one another. (If necessary, parents are encouraged to rephrase the information and questions according to their children's level of understanding).

Time of reflection and response:

- How do I feel when my prayers are not answered?
- How often do I persist in praying for what I need?
- Do I often pray for what I want or for what I need?

In Jesus' time, a widow had no support unless she had adult sons to help her. Here, the widow goes directly to the judge. The judge who is an unpleasant person, ignores her for a long time but she persists in her pursuit for justice. The judge finally acts and delivers justice not because he cares about the woman but because he knows that this is the only way to get rid of her.

The parable has a clear message: Jesus is not comparing God to an unjust judge, but saying that if the widow's perseverance obtains justice from an unjust judge, how much more we will obtain justice from a good and loving Father, who is full of mercy and compassion.

We can be so impatient sometimes and feel that God has not heard our prayers when they are not answered immediately. The parable is an invitation to us to persist in prayer especially in times of difficulties. Jesus tells us not to give up or lose heart. He tells us we 'need to pray continually and never lose heart'.

Our prayers will be answered, maybe not in the way we are expecting, but answered in the way that is beneficial to us.



ACROSS


- 2. To be treated fairly

DOWN


- 1. The period between sunset and sunrise (darkness)

- 5. To speak to or make a request to God



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


Activity #6: Complete the picture.


Activity #9: Let us pray.

The 5 Finger Prayer
